1. 2018-2019 Staff Nominations (LR): Non-public Attachment # 9

RSA 91-A:3 II provides certain conditions under which the School Board MAY enter into non-public session.

These conditions are:

- (a) The dismissal, promotion or compensation of any public employee or the disciplining of such employee, or the investigation of any charges against him, unless the employee (1) has a right to a meeting and (2) requests that the meeting be open, in which case the request shall be granted.*
- (b) The hiring of any person as a public employee.*
- (c) Matters which, if discussed in public, would likely affect adversely the reputation of any person, other than a member of the body or agency itself, unless such person requests an open meeting.*
- (d) Consideration of the acquisition, sale or lease of real or personal property which, if discussed in public, would likely benefit a party or parties whose interests are adverse to those of the general community.*
- (e) Consideration or negotiation of pending claims or litigation which has been threatened in writing or filed against the body or agency or any subdivision thereof, or against any member thereof because of his membership in such body or agency, until the claim or litigation has been fully adjudicated or otherwise settled.*

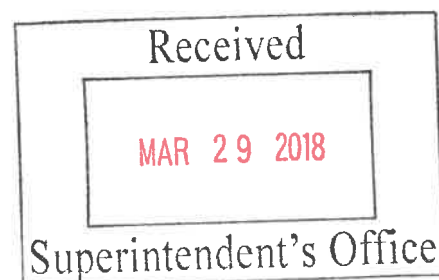
Dear Joyce Coll,

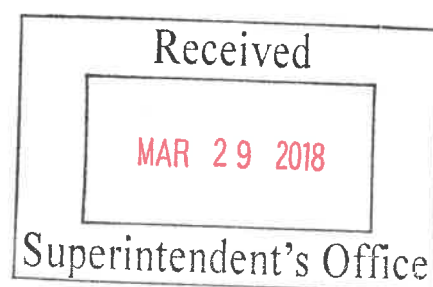
I would like to inform you that I am resigning from my position as a history teacher at Alvirne High School effective the end of the school year.

As you know February was a short month. Although a short month, it was a very busy month, with a lot of data. This month I received 13 referrals, some of which were specific to the Grandparent Support Group referrals. This referral number was higher than the number of referrals in February 2017.

This month I had the pleasure of coordinating the food drive with the Togetherhood Committee who partnered with the YMCA to obtain donations for Feed Our Kids. As most of you know Feed Our Kids is the weekend food bags in the Hudson School District. At the beginning of the year I spoke with the organizer of the program, and she was concerned at how Feed Our Kids could continue with such an increased need. It was therefore even more exciting to hear that over 1,000 food items were gathered during this drive to support the program. This of course is will be an ongoing need, but at least in the near future, we know the food is available.

One document that I have developed for the district has been a summer camp guide for families. I believe this is the third year I have put together this information. The summer camp guide is a comprehensive listing of camps, and other resources for the summer. I finalized this document this month, (although there could be updates if needed). I sent this document out to counselors and appropriate staff, and have also attached a copy for your review.

- B. Presentations to the Board**

Hills Garrison School Presentation on Artist-in-Residence Experience

Caroline Bonsaint, Art Teacher at Hills Garrison School, addressed the board with students Sam House, Lyla Smalley, Madeline Sargent and Addison Tobin.

Caroline had applied for a grant and held an art fundraiser so they could have the Artist-in-Residence experience. The students worked on their project for one hour per week school-wide. Currently finishing up the firing process. After this project was complete, students wrote a reflection.

Students created clay animals that had beads inside or maracas.

Students described the process used to make their project and showed how it made music.

Adult Learning Center (ALC)

Before and after-school care.

Mrs. Langlais addressed the board and explained the timeline for what occurred.

The School Board received two complaints regarding the Adult Learning Center after they denied two special needs students from attending their program which is held in our schools. The ALC told the parents that they could not afford to hire paras to be with their children.

The School Board looked into their contract and found the contract had expired in 2009. The School Board, ALC, and the parents met at a board meeting during non-public session to see if they could work out a solution. Outcome: Helped to find a para but ALC stated they were unable to pay for this. Ms. Langlais then hired para as her own employee and para is now working with the two students. The before and after-school program contract is now out to bid. The ALC pulled out their bid.

C. Public Input

Crystal Gordan, Fort Jackson Dr.

They have read the comments regarding their daughter and the ALC on social media. They feel their daughter has been discriminated against due to her physical disability being in a wheelchair. They worked for four months to come to a solution. Glad this is finally resolved and is now going to the program with the para. Originally met in non-public to keep the details private but now see it as an opportunity to create a wonderful accepting program for all.

Beth Baker, Ironwood Road

Didn't read any comments on social media; want a fair and equitable program for all. What is the bid process and parameters?

Karen Burnell responded. Six vendors have replied; bids are due March 30. They will be reviewed and the School Board will decide who gets the contract. The vendor must be open to all students regardless of their disability. Cost is part of the bid process.

Mrs. Milbouer- Please get the facts, built a ramp for a girl.

Emma Young, 2 Gordan St.

Where will the program take place? The program will use the same space it is currently using.

Hours: 6:00 am to 8:05 am, same as it is currently.

Ms. Milbouer: The ALC is obligated to let parents know what is going on with the program. The program uses district space but the ALC runs the program. This was a clear violation of a little girl's civil rights which is why we got involved.
