Junior Roadmap for the Summer

The Alvirne High School Counseling Office recognizes that students have choices once they graduate from high school to be productive members of society. The four options they have are:

Continue your education Gap Year/Volunteer Get a job Join the military

To ensure that we plan and prepare properly for each specific choice, we have created specific benchmarks or a "Roadmap" to assist everyone on their journey.

Continue your education

This is sometimes the most complicated and stressful choice some families make. There are so many moving parts and some uncertainty related to schools and the financial obligations attached to them. This section is not a fully comprehensive plan but more like a solid starting point. This will provide some suggestions and resources to start down the path. You are strongly encouraged to set up times to meet with the school counselor to review plans and resources to ensure that all options have been considered. There will be a senior parent night in the fall and counselors will be making presentations to senior English classes to reinforce the plans that have been reviewed over the spring. The title of this section is "Continue your education" because we are not just talking about college but rather continuing to learn new skills beyond high school with the goal to eventually enter the workforce. The options here consist of different levels of instruction from career schools to 4-year colleges and universities. Each have their own advantages and it depends on the goals that students have as to which is the most appropriate. Below is the list of the five things that are suggested to begin and/or complete prior to the start of the next school year. There are also several other resources that may be of some help.

7 Things to work on before September:

- 1) Research schools and institutions that are of interest to you and plan on visiting them to see if they "fit" what you are looking for. It is also suggested to visit these places again in the fall when there are students on campus to see if the feeling you had at first is the same you had the second time. We like to see between <u>5-7 schools</u> initially with the goal to apply to the top 5.
- 2) Students can begin to work on the <u>Common Application essay</u> now and over the summer. The writing prompts for the 2023-2024 application cycle are:

- 1. Some students have a background, identity, interest, or talent that is so meaningful they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like you, then please share your story.
- 2. The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience?
- 3. Reflect on a time when you questioned or challenged a belief or idea. What prompted your thinking? What was the outcome?
- 4. Describe a problem you've solved or a problem you'd like to solve. It can be an intellectual challenge, a research query, an ethical dilemma anything that is of personal importance, no matter the scale. Explain its significance to you and what steps you took or could be taken to identify a solution.
- 5. Discuss an accomplishment, event, or realization that sparked a period of personal growth and a new understanding of yourself or others.
- 6. Describe a topic, idea, or concept you find so engaging that it makes you lose all track of time. Why does it captivate you? What or who do you turn to when you want to learn more?
- 7. Share an essay on any topic of your choice. It can be one you've already written, one that responds to a different prompt, or one of your own design.

- 3) Students may begin to ask their teachers and counselor to write <u>letters of recommendation</u> for them. Each school has their own restrictions as to how many letters they require. It is a good rule of thumb to get two letters from teachers and one from your school counselor. It is also suggested to get a letter from someone outside of the school that may be required for scholarships later in the year. It is highly recommended that students ask their teachers and counselor personally followed up by adding them to the student's Naviance page. This will link the teachers' account to the students' account making the process of uploading the letter and the teacher evaluation form much easier.
- 4) Create a <u>Common Application account</u>. Out of the approximately **3800** institutions of higher education, close to 900 schools use the Common Application. Students can begin this in August by going to <u>www.commonapp.org</u>. School counselors have informed students of this opportunity during our classroom visits during the spring of the junior year.
- 5) Update your information or get on for the first time and become familiar with Naviance. You can get on it via Clever. This will be of great use to you as you proceed with applications to college and scholarships.

6) Create your account or continue to use The College Guidance Network. Access can be found here:

7) Finally, in August it is recommended that families begin the **financial aid process** by applying for your Federal Student Aid ID (FSAID) https://**fsaid**.ed.gov. The actual financial aid form cannot be completed until after December 1, 2023. Many resources can be found at www.fafsa.ed.gov. The FAFSA4caster is another interesting tool that the federal government provides to estimate your financial aid opportunities. THIS WILL BE A GRADUATION REQUIREMENT FOR THE CLASS OF 2024 AND BEYOND. TO MEET THIS REQUIREMENT, FAMILIES WILL NEED TO COMPLETE A QUICK QUESTION DURING THE ANNUAL VERIFICATION PROCESS THIS SUMMER.

By no means is this an exhaustive list but it is a good start. It is highly recommended that you have frequent contact with the school counselor if there are any questions or concerns.
