"Am I in trouble?" This is often the first thing students say if they are asked to come to the office or to report to the Student Support Center. Most often, the answer is "No"!

Kids often make mistakes as they learn to get along with others and to meet the expectations of school. When minor problems come up -- in the cafeteria, at recess, in the halls or on the bus -- the first step is to talk to all the students involved. We can often resolve the situation with a conversation, an apology or reminders about expectations at school.

If your child says, "I got in trouble today" and you have not received an email or phone call, it's because there was a minor issue and an adult at school had a conversation with him/her about positive behavior choices. There will be no additional "trouble". If you have questions after talking about the situation with your child, please let us know.

As a Reminder...Students sometimes bring toys or other personal items to school. Toys and personal items are not allowed to be used during recess (except for balls, books or writing/drawing tools). Please be sure that your child keeps their favorite toys at home so that nothing is lost, damaged or traded away.
