Brief Explanation of School District Warrant Articles

Warrant Article 1 - Operating Budget

The proposed budget is \$67,509,020. The budget maintains current staffing, class sizes, maintenance and operations. If this article fails, the default budget is \$67,596,534. (Estimated tax impact: \$0.11 Default tax rate impact: \$0.13)

Warrant Article 2 – Collective Bargaining Agreement between the Hudson School Board and the PSRPs

The two-year agreement brings hourly wages closer to the median for paraprofessionals and food service workers in southern NH. Cost for 2024-25 is \$751,496 and cost for 2025-26 is \$364,152. (Estimated tax impact: \$0.16)

Warrant Article 3 – Collective Bargaining Agreement between the Hudson School Board and AFSCME

A two-year agreement with AFSCME which includes Principals, Assistant Principals, Directors, Psychologists and School Counselors. Includes an increase of 2.75% in each year of the contract. Cost breakdown: 2024-25 - \$155,027; 2024-25 - \$159,290. (Estimated tax impact: \$0.03)

Warrant Article 4 – Roof Replacement at Dr. H.O. Smith Elementary School

Replaces the roof at Dr. H.O. Smith Elementary School for \$250,000 with a new white fully-adhered membrane roof with a 20-year labor/materials warranty. Funds for this project to come from the School Renovations capital reserve account. (Estimated tax impact: \$0.00)

Warrant Article 5 – Science Labs at Hudson Memorial School

Raises \$200,000 to replace two more science labs at Hudson Memorial School. Two labs were updated in the 2023-2024 school year. There are a total of eight that need renovation.

This is a special warrant article with funding to come from surplus funds from the current school year and no amount to be raised by additional taxation. (Estimated tax impact: \$0.00)

Warrant Article 6 – Renovate the Checkers Kitchen at Alvirne

Raises \$250,000 to update the kitchen for the former Checkers restaurant at Alvirne, to be used instead for the food service program for students attending Alvirne.

This is a special warrant article with funding to come from surplus funds from the current school year and no amount to be raised by additional taxation. (Estimated tax impact: \$0.00)

Warrant Article 7 – Replace the Hallway Flooring at Hudson Memorial School

Raises \$94,000 to replace the hallway flooring throughout the Hudson Memorial School.

This is a special warrant article with funding to come from surplus funds from the current school year and no amount to be raised by additional taxation. (Estimated tax impact: \$0.00)

Warrant Article 8 – Establish a Capital Reserve Account for the Alvirne Farm

Newly establishes a capital reserve account to support the repair, improvement and maintenance of the farm facilities at Alvirne.

This is a special warrant article with funding to come from surplus funds from the current school year and no amount to be raised by additional taxation. (Estimated tax impact: \$0.00)

Warrant Article 9 – Voting Day Change (by petition)

A petition warrant article was submitted to change from the current March voting day to an April voting day. This would also change the Deliberative Session dates from days in early February to days in early March. The language proposed indicates this would only take effect if this article passes on both the town side and the school side. This article is not recommended by the School Board with a vote of 5-0.

Brief Explanation of Town Fiscal Year 2025 Warrant Articles

A Citizen's Guide to Understanding Terms

Appropriations: A sum of money or total of assets devoted to a specific purpose.

Article: Individual numbered items within the warrant.

Board of Selectmen: An elected body of five (5) individuals that govern the Town.

Budget Committee: An elected body of eleven (11) individuals which reviews and elects to approve or not approve all Town and School budgets, as well as any and all articles involving the expenditure of funds. The budgets presented are prepared by the Budget Committee.

Capital Reserve Fund: Basically a "savings account" created by action of a prior Town meeting vote into which funds are placed for a designated purpose, but limited to capital expenditures such as a piece of major equipment, buildings, etc. or a large scale project such as property revaluation.

Map/Lot: This designates the exact location of a parcel of land on the Town tax map.

Petition Warrant Article: An article submitted by citizen petition. Must have the signatures of at least twenty-five (25) registered voters to be included on the Warrant.

Planning Board: An elected body consisting of six (6) members elected by the voters and one (1) ex-officio member appointed by the Board of Selectmen.

Property Tax Exemption: A deduction amount from the total value of a property for qualified property taxpayers.

Revolving Fund: A special purpose fund setup for a purpose as defined under RSA 31-95-h.

RSA: Refers to a State law – $\underline{\mathbf{R}}$ evised $\underline{\mathbf{S}}$ tatute $\underline{\mathbf{A}}$ nnotated. These laws can be found on the State of New Hampshire's website under "Laws and Rules".

Special Warrant Article: As provided in State law, this designation identifies any appropriation in the warrant as non-lapsing (having no expiration date) and non-transferable (not to be used for anything other than the specified expressed purpose).

Tax Rate Impact: The cost of a specific article on the tax rate. The tax rate impact is calculated by dividing the cost of the article by the total property valuation for the Town and then dividing that amount by 1,000 to determine the impact to the tax rate.

Unassigned Fund Balance: The accumulation of revenues over expenditures, accrued over the years. It can be used for any purpose voted on by the Board of Selectmen, with voter approval. It has been used to offset tax increases as well as to offset the cost of larger projects.

Warrant: The official name for a group of articles presented to the voters.

Zoning Ordinance: Rules adopted by the Town for the regulation of land. These ordinances may be found under Chapter 334 of the Town Code.

- Article 2 Operating Budget Proposes a budget of \$35,527,448. Major increases are for increased Public Works materials and equipment, Fire Department protective equipment and training. In addition, it includes the cost for filling the vacant Assistant Town Administrator position. If the Operating Budget is approved, the estimated Operating Budget Tax rate would be \$4.94 per \$1,000 which is an increase of \$0.23 over the previous year.
- Article 3 Sewer Fund Operating Budget Proposes a budget of \$2,426,706. The Sewer Fund is a Special Revenue Fund and all costs are paid by sewer users and not the property taxpayer. There are no changes to the sewer rates for Fiscal Year 2025. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- Article 4 Water Fund Operating Budget Proposes a budget of \$4,371,665. The Water Fund is a Special Revenue Fund and all costs are paid by water users and not the property taxpayer. There are no changes to the water rates for Fiscal Year 2025. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- Article 5 Hudson Public Works Union Contract Provides for a 5 year contract with the employees in the Hudson Public Works Union. Employees in this union include Foremen, Equipment Operators, Truck Driver Laborers and other Public Works employees. Provides for a 3.0% COLA in years 1 and 2 and a 3.5% COLA in years 3, 4 and 5 as well as anniversary steps for those that are eligible. (Tax impact is \$0.02 per \$1,000)
- Article 6 Hudson Firefighters IAFF Union Contract Provides for a 3 year contract with the employees in the Hudson Firefighters IAFF Union. Employees in this union include Firefighter/AEMTs, Paramedics, Lieutenants and Fire Dispatchers. Provides for a 3.0% COLA in year 1 and 2 and a 4% COLA in year 3 and anniversary steps for those that are eligible. (Tax impact is \$0.05 per \$1,000)
- Article 7 Funding for One Fire Captain Training Officer Proposes to hire a training officer for the Fire Department. This would be a Fire Captain who would be responsible for developing, implementing and managing the Fire Department's training program. This amount includes the salary (\$92,423) and benefits (\$72,468) for the position. (Tax impact is \$0.03 per \$1,000)
- Article 8 Town Wide Paving Proposes to increase the Town annual paving budget from \$990,000 to \$1,090,000. The paving budget was last increased in 2021. There are over 200 lane miles of roads in Hudson that the Town is responsible to maintain. (Tax impact is \$0.02 per \$1,000)
- Article 9 Melendy Road Bridge Rehabilitation Proposes to raise funds for the construction phase of the Melendy Road bridge rehabilitation project. The State Bridge Aid program is providing the bulk of the funding for this bridge which is on the State's red list. This bridge is on Melendy Road over First Brook. (Tax impact is \$0.02 per \$1,000)
- Article 10 Circumferential Highway Feasibility Study Proposes to raise the Town's 20% share of a feasibility and preliminary engineering study that the NHDOT has listed on their 10 year highway plan. This study would cover the southern portion of the proposed highway and would be used to determine if the highway is economically and environmentally feasible to move forward. (Tax impact is \$0.04 per \$1,000)
- **Article 11 Police Safety Equipment Capital Reserve Funding -** Funds a Capital Reserve Fund that was established in March 2021 for the purpose of purchasing new and replacement body worn cameras, Tasers and bullet proof shields. Proposes to use \$105,000 from the Town's fund balance of approximately \$7.6 million as the source of funding. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)

- **Article 12 Property Revaluation Capital Reserve Funding -** Funds a Capital Reserve Fund that was established in March 2008 for the purpose of future property revaluations. NH Municipalities are required to reassess property a minimum of once every 5 years. Hudson's last Town-wide property reassessment was in 2022. (Tax impact is \$0.01 per \$1,000)
- Article 13 VacCon Truck Replacement Capital Reserve Funding Funds a Capital Reserve Fund that was established in March 2006 for the purpose of replacing the VacCon truck. The VacCon truck is used to clean out the Town's sewer system and storm water drainage system. ½ of the funding comes from the Sewer Fund and ½ comes from the General Fund. The truck has a life expectancy of 8 to 10 years. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- **Article 14 Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Funding -** Funds a Capital Reserve Fund that was established in March 2000 for the purpose of purchasing and replacing the Town's large fire apparatus such as engines, pumpers, ladder trucks, and forestry units. (Tax impact is \$0.01 per \$1,000)
- Article 15 Fire Apparatus Refurbishment/Repair Capital Reserve Funding Funds a Capital Reserve Fund that was established in March 2008 for the purpose of refurbishing and repairing the Town's large fire apparatus to extend their useful life. (Tax impact is \$0.02 per \$1,000)
- **Article 16 Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Funding -** Funds a Capital Reserve Fund that was established in March 2011 for the purpose of purchasing fire and EMS equipment including firefighter protective clothing, self-contained breathing apparatus, and other specialized equipment. (Tax impact is \$0.01 per \$1,000)
- Article 17 Generator Replacement/Repair Capital Reserve Funding Funds a Capital Reserve Fund that was established in March 2022 for the purpose of replacing and repairing the Town's emergency power generators. There are currently 21 emergency generators equally split between town buildings, sewer pump stations and water booster stations and wells. The funding for this article is split 1/3 from the General Fund, 1/3 from the Sewer Fund and 1/3 from the Water Fund. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- **Article 18 Benson Park Renovation Capital Reserve Funding -** Funds a Capital Reserve Fund that was established in March 1998 for the purpose of purchasing and renovation the Benson Park property. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- **Article 19 Establish a Drainage Capital Reserve Fund -** Establishes a Capital Reserve Fund under RSA 35:1 for the purpose repairing or replacing the Town's storm drain system. There are approximately 100 miles of storm drainage in Town and much of it predates the 1970's. (Tax impact is \$0.02 per \$1,000)
- Article 20 Discontinue Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund Capital Reserve Fund Dissolves a Capital Reserve Fund that was established in 1994 for the purposing of purchasing and replacing ambulances and equipment. These are now bought through the EMS Revolving Fund. The remaining funds in this reserve fund will be paid back to the Town's general fund. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- Article 21 Revised Property Tax Exemption for the Elderly Raises the exemption amounts and annual income levels for qualified elderly residents. In 2023, the Town granted 179 elderly exemptions. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)

- Article 22 Revised Property Tax Exemption for the Disabled Raises the exemption amounts and annual income levels for qualified disabled residents. In 2023, the Town granted 27 disabled exemptions. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- **Article 23 Revised Property Tax Exemption for the Blind** Raises the exemption amount for qualified blind residents. In 2023, the Town granted 14 blind exemptions. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- Article 24 Establish a Fire Alarm/Master Box Revolving Fund Establishes a revolving fund per RSA 31:95-h (b) for the purpose of maintaining and monitoring the Town's Fire Alarm and Master Box System. Funding for this revolving fund will come from system user fees collected from commercial and residential customers. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- **Article 25 Lease Agreement South Water Tank** Proposes a lease agreement with Verizon Wireless to install signal boosting equipment on the South Hudson Water Tank. 1st year lease payment to the Town is \$28,800 and will increase by 2% annually for the life of the lease. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- Article 26 Lease Agreement West Road Landfill Proposes a lease agreement with Kearsarge Energy for a solar panel farm on a portion of the capped West Road Landfill. 1st year lease payment to the Town is \$48,400 and will increase by 2.25% annually for the life of the lease. The Town and School District will also receive savings, estimated to start at \$97,389 in the first year and increasing on an annual basis for the life of the lease, on their electric bills based on the amount of electricity produced. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- Article 27 Study Needs for New Town Hall (by Petition) By citizen petition. This petition proposes to conduct a study to review the costs of renovating the current Town Hall or building a new facility. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- Article 28 Required Public Input (by Petition) By citizen petition. This petition proposes to require any public board, committee or general public meeting to include time for public input. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- Article 29 Comprehensive Infrastructure Study (by Petition) By citizen petition. This petition proposes to complete an independent infrastructure study of developments impact to traffic, emergency services, schools, sewer and water needs and impact fees assessed to developers. The study results will be used to upgrade the Master Plan, Zoning ordinances and land use regulations. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- **Article 30 Change Election Day Date (by Petition)** By citizen petition. This petition proposes to change the date of the annual Town and School District elections from the 2nd Tuesday in March to the 2nd Tuesday in April. A similar article is on the School District ballot and both articles would need to pass for this to take effect. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- Article 31 West Road Landfill Remote Control Airplane Club (by Petition) By citizen petition. This petition proposes to allow the Southern NH Radio Control Club continued use of the capped portion of the West Road Landfill. This is the area where the Solar Panel Farm is being proposed in Article 26. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)

- Article 32 Adopt Town Manager Form of Government (by Petition) By citizen petition. This petition proposes to change the form of Town government from the current Town Administrator form to a Town Manager form. (Tax impact is \$0.00 per \$1,000)
- **Article 33 Amend Wetland Conservation District Boundaries** Proposes to increase the current wetland buffer from fifty (50) feet to seventy-five (75) feet for nonresidential uses.
- **Article 34 Amend General Regulations Flood Damage Prevention** Proposes to incorporate required changes to the Town Code Chapter 218 as required by the National Flood Insurance Program.
- **Article 35 Amend 334-6 Contractors Yard Definition** Proposes to add more definition to Chapter 334-6 of the Town Zoning Ordinance for Contractor's Yards.
- **Article 36 Amend Table of Permitted Uses Religious Purposes –** Proposes to amend the Zoning Ordinance Table of Permitted Uses to allow Religious Use of Land and Structures in all zoning districts per State RSA 674:76.
- **Article 37 Amend Table of Permitted Uses Farm Stands –** Proposes to amend the Zoning Ordinance Table of Permitted Uses to permit seasonal farm stands for retail sale of produce or Christmas trees in the Industrial (I) District.

Vote by Absentee Ballot

Absentee ballots are an option for registered voters to vote by mail as a substitute to voting in-person. The applicant must first fill out an absentee ballot application in order to receive an absentee ballot.

- If hand-delivering the absentee ballot application to the Town Clerk, the application must be received by Monday, March 11 at 4:00 PM in order to receive an absentee ballot to fill out at that time. A designated delivery agent may also physically bring your absentee ballot to your designated polling location on Election Day, March 12th, by no later than 5:00 PM in order to be counted.*
- If you are mailing the absentee ballot application, the application must be received by the Town Clerk in time to process the application, and in return, mail an absentee ballot to you. When returning the absentee ballot by mail, it is your responsibility to ensure the Town Clerk receives your ballot at Town Hall on or before Tuesday, March 12.
- Any absentee ballot received after March 12 will be deemed invalid and not accepted.
